

Isn't that the New Testament in a nutshell? No one's pneumatology produced the Upper Room. A Spirit-baptized church in need of vocabulary and voice produced the New Testament.

I welcome you Pentecostal scholars and learners to this exciting campus. We rejoice that here you can be heard and hear from each other the best explanations of souls on fire.

#### THE THEME

#### Pentecostalism and the World Church: Ecumenical Opportunities and Challenges

The Pentecostal-charismatic movement has often been hailed as the fastest growing movement in world Christianity. These include classical Pentecostal churches, charismatic movements in the historic churches, and loose fellowships and networks of nondenominational and independent charismatics and Pentecostal congregations and Para church organizations. Many Pentecostals and charismatic witness to a profound spiritual unity that they believe to be a consequence of their shared experience of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit in Spirit-baptism. Members of this Society also represent nearly all sectors of the Christian community. We invite presenters and participants to consider the ecumenical implications of the movement as this applies to Our Lord's prayer for unity (John 17). The following issues are among those that may be examined:

- The relationship between

  World Council of Churches, regional
  and national ecumenical bodies,
  world Christian communions and the
  various multilateral and bilateral
  ecumenical dialogues.
- Analysis of Pentecostal-charismatic resistance or indifference to ecumenism.

- Analysis of Pentecostal-charismatic participation in ecumenical efforts.
- The distinct contribution that the Pentecostal-charismatic tradition can make to ecumenism.
- The challenge posed by ecumenism to the Pentecostal-charismatic movement.
- Resources in Pentecostalcharismatic history, spirituality, praxis and theology to consider ecumenical issues.
- The reception and/or transformation of theological and ecclesiological paradigms for Christian unity by Pentecostals and charismatics.
- Ecumenical implications of existing Pentecostal and charismatic forms of unity inclusive of both its spiritual and structural dimensions.
- Analysis of existing tensions between Pentecostal-charismatic churches and other Christian churches and bodies.
- The relationship in Pentecostalcharismatic theology and praxis between Christian and/or Church unity, mission and eschatological fulfillment.

#### Shuttle service:

Hotels do not provide a shuttle service to and from the airports. There will be a shuttle service offered by Southeastern College from Tampa International Airport to the hotels on Wednesday-afternoon, March 13. and Thursday March 14. On Sunday, March 17, a shuttle service will be provided from the hotels to Tampa International Airport. The final date to register for this shuttle service is March 7, 2002. The cost for this additional service is \$25.00 for each trip per person. Please meet the driver at the baggage claim area, who will be holding a Southeastern College sign (SEC). The College-Shuttle will leave from Tampa Airport to the hotels in Lakeland every 60 to 90 minutes.

Southeastern College will also provide a shuttle service from both to and from the hotels during the conference, from Thursday afternoon to Saturday evening. Shuttle schedules will be available at registration. The costs for this shuttle service are included in the registration fee.

# Directions to Southeastern College when arriving by air or car:

If you will or cannot use the shuttle service, we recommend that you rent a car at the airport. Cab fees will be at least \$ 50. If you choose to do so, we recommend this easy route to Southeastern College. It minimizes traffic lights and congestion:

Take I-4 to Exit 19, and travel south on Route 33 (Lakeland Hills Blvd.). Turn left on Memorial Blvd. Turn right (south) on Lake Parker Avenue. Turn left on 98 South. Take 98 South to North Crystal Lake Drive. Turn left. Turn left on Longfellow Blvd. Take Longfellow Boulevard and see Southeastern College on the right hand side, at 1000 Longfellow Blvd.

# Directions to Holiday Inn when arriving by air or car:

Traveling east or west on I-4, take exit 15A – Polk Parkway Toll road to Exit 7 – South Florida Avenue. Turn left and pass through three lights, and the Holiday Inn Lakeland/ South will be on the left.

# Directions to the Four Points Sheraton from Tampa:

Take I-4 east to *Exit 15A*, which is Polk County Parkway (\$.50 - \$3.00 toll). Follow Parkway to *Exit 7*, which is South Florida Avenue. Take a *right* onto *South Florida Ave*. Four points Hotel is approximately ½ mile on the right.

# Directions to the Four Points Sheraton from Orlando:

Take I-4 West to Exit 20A, which is Polk County Parkway. Follow Parkway to Exit 7, which is South Florida Avenue. Take a left under the Parkway onto South Florida Avenue. Four Points Hotel is approximately ¼ mile on the right.

# Directions to Southeastern College from both hotels:

From notels take a left (north) onto South Florida Avenue. Turn right on Beacon Road. Follow Beacon Road until you come to the stop sign at the dead end. Turn left onto Lake Hollingsworth Road. Follow around the lake until you come to the traffic lights and turn left onto North Crystal Lake Road. Follow North Crystal Lake Road through the stoplight to Longfellow Boulevard and turn left.

Southeastern College will be on your right.


Parking at Southeastern College:
